

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PREFACE

This is the **36**th **edition** of the Islamic Development Bank's **Statistical Yearbook**, previously known as the **Statistical Monograph on the Key Socio-Economic Statistics on IDB Member Countries¹**. In this new and improved edition we have sharpened our focus on the most important statistical highlights and trends, while making the full dataset — covering more than 200 social, economic and financial indicators for all the 56 IDB member countries — available on an attached USB flash drive.

Part I of the full version of the statistical yearbook (available on the flash drive) covers **Demographic and Human Development Indicators**, including data on the population size and structure, vital statistics, health, education, poverty, human development, information and communications technology, employment, productivity, competitiveness, environment, land use, and food and agricultural production.

Part II covers **Macroeconomic Indicators** and provides information on the national accounts, government finance, inflation, money supply, exchange rates and interest rates. The national accounts data provide essential information on economic performance in terms of growth and the structure of output, investments, and savings.

Part III covers **External Sector Economic Indicators** and presents statistics on external trade, balance of payments, external debt, and financial flows, including the IDB Group operations data.

The Statistical Annexes of the printed version of this publication includes 15 selected tables from **Part I, II and III** and 5 tables on the IDB Group Operations for the main IDB geographic regions and divisions.

As in the previous editions, the present publication contains individual country data as well as a number of aggregates. They include the aggregate for all the 56 IDB member countries, aggregates for the four IDB regional groupings (SSA-22, MENA-19, Asia-8, and CIT-7), two aggregates based on the United Nation's classification of the "least developed countries" (LDMC-25 and Non-LDMC-31), an aggregate for the OIC member states, as well as the global aggregates for all developing countries, all least developed countries, all developed countries, and the world.

We hope that this statistical yearbook will be a useful tool for all those interested in studying social and economic developments in the IDB member countries and for monitoring their progress towards achieving the targets set out under the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

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



TECHNICAL NOTE


A. AGGREGATION RULES

In calculating statistical aggregates, the following rules based on the World Bank's approach were followed:

- Aggregate data for IDB are either totals or weighted averages.
- No aggregate values are calculated if missing data account for more than a third of the number of observations in a given year.
- Aggregates of ratios are calculated as weighted averages of the ratios using the value of the denominator as weight.
- Aggregate growth rates are calculated using exponential trend function. The resulting growth rates reflect trends that are not unduly influenced by exceptional values.
- Aggregates for income groups (such as LDCs, developing countries, developed countries, and the World) are taken directly from the data source, except for the OIC countries and the regional and economic groupings which are computed by the IDB staff.

HIGHLIGHTS

1 PEOPLE

1.1 Population Structure


More than 1.7 billion people lived in the 56 IDB member countries in 2015. This was 23% of the world population.

The largest share of the member countries' population lived in the Asia region (38.9% or 672 million), followed by MENA (28.6%, 493 million), Sub-Saharan Africa (27.8%, 480 million), and the CIT (4.6%, 80 million). The most populous member countries were Indonesia (258 million), Pakistan (189 million), Nigeria (182 million), Bangladesh (161 million), and Egypt (91 million). These five countries accounted for more than half of the member countries' total population.

The average population density in the member countries was 54 persons per square kilometer (persons/km²), ranging widely from the highest in Bahrain (1,769 persons/km²) to the lowest in Suriname and Libya (3.5 persons/km²). The highest population density was in Asia and the lowest in the CIT region.

The gender structure of the population in the IDB member countries was skewed towards more men (50.7%) than women (49.3%). For every 100 females there were, on average, 103 males in 2015. The GCC member countries had the largest gender gap. Women accounted for only 26.7% of the total population in the UAE, 27.4% in Qatar, 33.7% in Oman, 38% in Bahrain, 43.5% in Saudi Arabia, and 43.8% in Kuwait. This was mainly due to the large numbers of (mostly male) expatriate workers living in the Gulf (**Figure 1**). In contrast, there are more women than men in the CIT region (except in Tajikistan), in a number of Sub-Saharan African countries (including Mozambique, Senegal, and Gambia), and in Turkey, Morocco and Tunisia.

The age structure of the population in the IDB member countries was more youthful than the world average in 2015. Moreover, for every 100 people in the economically active group (15-64 years) there were 63 people that were either too young




(0-14 years) or too old (65+ years) to work. Youth dependency accounted for 89% of the total dependency ratio in the member countries, which was broadly in line with the average for the least developed countries, but nearly double the ratio for the high-income countries. Youth dependency was highest in the Sub-Saharan African region (90%), followed by Asia (56%), MENA (53%), and the CIT (49%).

1.2 Population Dynamics

The IDB member countries' population more than doubled since the Bank's inception in 1975, with the fastest cumulative growth in Sub-Saharan Africa and MENA, and the slowest in the CIT. But the population growth slowed significantly over the past 20 years from an annual average of 2.7% in 1984 to 2.0% in 2014. Although crude death rates declined from 4.0% to 2.8% during the same period, crude birth rates declined even faster

from 12.4% to 7.5%. regional the level, the population in the Sub-Saharan African member countries continued to grow the fastest an average annual rate of 2.8%, followed by MENA (1.9%), Asia and the CIT (1.6% each). In 2015, nine member countries had average population



growth of more than 3%, sharply contrasting with war-torn Syria, where the population actually declined (-1.4%), reflecting mass migration and the refugee flows (**Figure 2**).

The average number of children born to a woman by the end of her childbearing years (the total fertility rate) declined in the IDB member countries from 4.9 in 1990 to 3.5 in 2014, but remained significantly higher than the world average (2.5) and the average in the low and middle-income countries (2.6). The fertility rate was highest in the Sub-Saharan Africa member countries (5.6), and lowest in Asia (2.8) and the CIT (2.5).

Meanwhile, the average under-five mortality rates also declined significantly in the IDB member countries from 11.7% (of all live births) in 1990 to 5.2% in 2015. But child mortality remains alarmingly high in the Sub-Saharan Africa region (9.9%) — especially in Chad (13.9%), Somalia (13.7%), Sierra Leone (12.0%), Mali (11.5%), and Nigeria (10.9%) — and compares unfavourably to the average for the least developed countries world-wide (7.6%).

Based on the current growth trends, the population of the IDB member countries is projected to reach 1.9 billion by 2020, nearly tripling since the Bank's inception.

1.3 Education

The adult literacy


rate in the member countries averaged 73.3%, with more literate men (79.8%) than women (66.8%) in 2015. The highest literacy rate was the CIT among member countries (99.5%),followed **MENA** the by (82.8%),region Asia (71.8%) and Sub-Saharan Africa (52.9%). Some of the lowest literacy rates were in Niger (15.5%) and Guinea (25.3%).literacy rates were




considerably during the past 20 years, but men still outnumbered women in most of the member countries. Even so, there were several member countries were females outnumbered males (Figure 3 and 4).

1.4 Health

In 2013, life expectancy at birth in the IDB member countries averaged 66.3 years compared to 59.8 in 1990. The MENA region had the highest life expectancy at

birth (73.1 years), followed by the CIT (69.4 years) and the Asia region (68.4 years). In the Sub-Saharan African member countries, life expectancy averaged only 55.8 years.


Total health expenditure in the member countries increased to an



average of 4.5% of GDP in 2014 from 3.3% in 1995. The most remarkable increase in health spending was in the MENA region, where the expenditure rose from 3.5% to 5.9% of GDP. In contrast, the health expenditure in the Asian member countries remained low at only 3.1% of GDP. In per-capita terms, healthcare expenditure more than tripled in the IDB member countries as a group, but varied widely, in 2014, from the highest in

MENA (US\$ 384), and the CIT (US\$ 257), to only US\$ 80 in both the Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa. UAE, Kuwait and Bahrain had the highest per capita health expenditure of more than US\$ 1,000.

The share of the member countries' population with access to safe



drinking water and improved sanitation facilities increased steadily over the past 20 years and averaged 84.8% and 62.5%, respectively, in 2015. But there was a large variation among the countries, ranging from 100% in Turkey, Bahrain and Qatar to only around 50% in Chad and Mozambique. On average, the Sub-Saharan African member countries had the poorest access to improved safe water sources and improved sanitation facilities at 70.2% and 26.1%, respectively (**Figure 5 and 6**).

According to the most recent figures, the IDB member countries had an average of 0.8 physicians, 1.8 nurses, and 1.2 hospital beds per 1,000 people. This compared quite unfavourably to the world average of 1.5 physicians, 3.3 nurses, and 2.9 hospital beds. While the CIT countries were broadly in line with the high-income countries on these three healthcare indicators, the Sub-Saharan African member countries had on average only 0.2 physicians and 1 nurse per 1,000 people.

1.5 Poverty and Human Development

The latest World Bank data indicate that the proportion of the IDB member countries' population living below the international poverty line of 2011 PPP US\$ 1.9 per day generally declined over the past 20 years. Among the member countries where the data is available, five had poverty rates of less than 10%: Malaysia (0.6%), Turkey (2.3%), Kazakhstan (2.9%), Azerbaijan (5.3%), and Morocco (8.9%). In contrast, several member countries had poverty rates of more than 50%, mostly in the Sub-Saharan Africa region: Guinea-Bissau (69.3%), Togo (58.7%), Guinea (55.2%), Mozambique (54.7%), and Sierra Leone (52.9%).

Based on the Human Development Index (HDI) — a composite statistic of life expectancy, education, and income per capita published by the United Nations Development Program — the IDB member countries, on average, fall into the "low human development" category with an average HDI score of 0.597. According to the latest estimates, MENA had the highest level of human development among the IDB member countries, scoring 0.727, which is equivalent to the "high human development" level and is slightly above the world average of 0.711 (**Figure 7**). In contrast, the HDI score for the Sub-Saharan Africa member countries was only 0.458, equivalent to the "low human development" level (**Tables 1 and 2**).

1.6 Science and Innovation


Over the past ten years there has been a rapid expansion in the development and the use of information and communications technology worldwide, and especially in developing countries. In the IDB member countries, mobile phone subscriptions per 100 people increased from 12.3 in 2004 to 96.4 in 2014, which was in line with the global

average. The highest number of mobile phone subscriptions per 100 people was in the CIT countries (113) and the MENA region (104). Meanwhile, the number of internet users increased from 4.9 per 100 people in 2004 to 26.1 in 2014. This, however, was lower than the global average of 40.7 and the high-income country average of 80.6. More than 90 out of 100 people used internet in Qatar, Bahrain and the UAE, while the internet usage rate was less than 2% in Somalia and Guinea.

According to the latest available data, the number of researchers in R&D ranged from 7.5 per one million people in Niger to 1,793 in Malaysia, which compared to the world average of 1,268. Similarly, the number of technicians in R&D ranged from 8.3 per one

million in Togo to 275 per one million in Egypt. The value of high technology exports ranged from US\$ 0.1 million in Gambia to US\$60.4 billion in Malaysia, while the number trademark of applications filed ranged from one in Somalia to 130,609 in Turkey.



2 ENVIRONMENT

2.1 Land Use and Emissions

The share of arable land in the IDB member countries increased from 8.6% of the total land area in 1990 to 9.7% in 2013. Non-agricultural land accounted for the lion's share (88%) of the total land area. Meanwhile, the share of the total land area covered by forests declined from 13.2% in 1990 to 11.1% in 2013.

2.2 Carbon Emissions

Total carbon dioxide emissions in the member countries more than doubled from 1,930 million metric tons in 1990 to 4,284 million metric tons in 2014. Similarly, the average per-capita carbon dioxide emissions in the member countries increased from 1.9 metric tons in 1990 to 2.5 metric tons in 2014.


2.3 Food and Agriculture

Agricultural and food production in the IDB member countries continued to grow over the past two decades. The aggregate IDB agricultural production index rose from 62.7 in 1990 to 125 in 2013 (an average annualized growth rate of 3%); while the food production index also rose from 61.4 in 1990 to 129.9 in 2013 (an average annualized growth rate of 3.3%). In 2013, Indonesia and Bangladesh accounted for 76.4% of the member countries' total rice production, while Pakistan, Turkey and Kazakhstan accounted for 52.5% of the member countries' total wheat production. Indonesia produced 28% of the member countries' annual maize output.

3 ECONOMY


3.1 Output Structure

The total value of output of the IDB member countries (IDB-56) more than tripled in the past 15 years. It increased from US\$ 1.9 trillion in 2000 to US\$ 6.9 trillion in 2014. but then declined by 13% to US\$ 6.0 trillion in 2015 as a result of a large drop in commodity prices



and a large exchange rate adjustment in some of the member countries. In 2015, the IDB member countries accounted for 8.2% of the world output, and 20.6% of the developing countries' output.

MENA the was largest IDB region by output (Figure 8), accounting for 52% of the total IDB countries member total, followed by Asia (28.2%), Sub-Africa Saharan (13%)and the CIT (6.6%). The three largest IDB economies Indonesia. Turkey



and Saudi Arabia — accounted for 37% of the IDB total (**Figure 9**). By contrast, the least developed countries accounted for only 8%.

3.2 Growth

The economies of the IDB member countries grew at an annual average rate of 4.8% during the past decade (2006-2015), which was marginally faster than 4.6% during 1996-

2005. Nine IDB economies grew at an average rate of more than 7% (**Table 3**). However, growth slowed significantly to 3.8% in 2014 and further still to 3.4% in 2015. The most remarkable slowdown was in the CIT region where the growth rate nearly halved to 3.7% from the 10-year average of 7.1%, reflecting the sharp decline in commodity prices and the economic slowdown in Russia and China, the CIT region's two major trading partners. Also reflecting the impact of lower commodity prices, growth in the MENA region declined to 2.4% from a 10-year average of 4.1%. In the Sub-Saharan African member countries, the slowdown was to 4.2% from the 10-year average of 5.9% (**Table 4**).

But despite the overall slowdown, some member countries still managed to maintain a strong pace of economic expansion, namely Turkmenistan (8.5%), Cote d'Ivoire

(8.2%), Mozambique (7.0%), Chad (6.9%), Uzbekistan (6.8%), Bangladesh (6.5%), and Djibouti (6.5%). By contrast, some of the IDB member economies contracted sharply as a result of external shocks or conflicts. Namely, real output dropped by 28.1% in wartorn Yemen, contracted by 23.9% in Sierra Leone due to the twin shock of the Ebola virus and the disruptions in iron mining, and declined 6.1% in Libya suffering from low oil prices and political instability.

3.3 Per Capita Income

The average per capita GDP adjusted for the purchasing power parity (PPP) rose from US\$ 9,934 in 2014 to US\$ 10,469 in 2015. The MENA region continued to have the largest per capita income (US\$ 19,346), followed by the CIT (US\$ 11,788), Asia (US\$ 7,869) and Sub-Saharan Africa (US\$ 3,945). The average per capita output for non-LDMCs was US\$ 13,029 as compared to US\$2,744 for LDMCs.

Over the past 10 years, the PPP-adjusted per-capita GDP in the IDB member countries grew at an average annual rate of 3.1%, down from 3.8% during the previous decade. The sharpest slowdown was among the fuel exporters (from 4.0% to 2.1%) whereas the growth in the Sub-Saharan Africa region slowed only modestly (from 4.6% to 4.3%).

3.4 Structure of Output and Demand

The contribution of agriculture to the GDP of the IDB member countries continued to decline from an average of 18.1% in 1990 to 11.2% in 2014. Similarly, the share of the manufacturing sector declined from 16.2% to 14.5%. Both of these reflected an expansion in the services sector (from 45.9% to 49.6%) and other industries, such as mining and utilities.

In 2014, the share of the agriculture sector in GDP ranged from as low as 0.1% in Qatar to 56% in Sierra Leone. Countries from Sub-Saharan Africa had the highest share of agriculture in GDP, especially Chad (52.6%), Togo (41.7%), Mali (39.5%), Niger (36.7%), Comoros (35.6%) and Burkina Faso (34.2%). Conversely, the contribution of industry to GDP ranged from the low of 11.8% in Comoros to 67.9% in gas-exporting Qatar. The contribution of the service sector ranged from 28.3% in Sierra Leone to 77.1% in tourism-reliant Maldives.

The shares of private and government consumption in the member countries' GDP declined from 62.9% and 14.5% in 1990 to 55.5% and 14.1%, respectively, in 2014. This decline is a mirror image of the increase in gross domestic saving rate from 22.0% of GDP in 1990 to 30.5% in 2014, and the increase in fixed investment from 22.7% in 1990 to 24.2% in 2014. Between 1990 and 2014, the IDB member countries also became significantly more open to international trade with exports of goods and services increasing from 23.8% of GDP to 38.1% and imports rising from 25.5% of GDP to 33.7%.

3.5 Employment

The total labour force in the IDB member countries increased substantially from 358 million in 1990 to 664 million in 2014, representing an average annual growth rate of 2.3%. This was about a quarter percentage point faster than population growth, and reflects — among other factors — a steady increase in the female labour force participation rate from an IDB member countries' average of 37.7% in 1990 to 41.4% in 2014.

The sectoral distribution of the labour force varied considerably from one country to

another. For example, the share of males employed in agriculture ranged from 0.6% of all men in Brunei to more than 60% in Uganda, Burkina Faso, Guinea, Mali, Niger and Togo. Nearly 80% of all employed females in Uganda were working in the agriculture sector, compared to a statistically insignificant number in Kuwait, Bahrain or Qatar.

The share of all employed males working in industry ranged from 8.0% in Mali to 58.4% in Qatar. Meanwhile, 0.9% of all employed females worked in industry in Guinea, compared to 24.4% in Iran. Interestingly, only 11.5% of all employed females worked in the service sector in Pakistan, while nearly all employed females in Saudi Arabia were working in the service industry.

3.6 Inflation

The inflation rate in the IDB member countries, measured as an annual change in the consumer price index, declined to an

average of 6.4% in 2015 from 6.7% in 2014, but was well above the world average of 3.3%. The inflation rate in 2015 varied from 0.1% in Lebanon to 30% in Yemen. Six countries recorded inflation rate of more than 10% while eight countries recorded inflation rate of less than one percent (**Figure 10**).


3.7 External Trade


The total value of the IDB member countries' external trade has been increasing steadily over the past two decades, reaching US\$ 5 trillion in 2014 (**Figure 11**). The IDB member


countries' exports of goods and services reached US\$ 2.7 trillion, having grown at an average annual growth rate of nearly 10% since 2004, helped by the commodity boom.

Over the last five years, the member countries' share of the world's total exports of goods and services fluctuated in the range of 10-12%, and compared to the 17-22% share of the developed economies and the 26-30% share of all developing countries (**Figure 12**).

The IDB member with countries largest exports of goods and services in 2014 were UAE (US\$ 391 billion), Saudi Arabia (US\$ 355 billion), Malaysia (US\$ 269 billion), Turkey (US\$ 220 billion), Indonesia (US\$ 203 billion), Qatar (US\$ 145 billion), Kuwait (US\$ 111 billion), and Iran (US\$ 104 billion). Together







they accounted for 68% of the total member countries' exports of goods and services. Similarly, the MENA region accounted for 64% of the total IDB member countries' imports, followed by Asia (23.7%), Sub-Saharan Africa (7.5%) and the CIT (4.8%).


The member countries' share of world imports of goods and services ranged between 9% and 10% during the past five years (**Figure 13**).

Intra-IDB member country trade remained stable at around 18% during 2010-2014. It stood at 18.3% in 2014, which was below the 2015 intra-OIC trade target of 20%. The share of intra-IDB merchandise exports in total exports continued on its upward trend reaching 17.5% in 2014 up from 10.6% in 2000. Similarly, the share of intra-IDB merchandise imports in total merchandise imports increased to 19.2% in 2014 from 14.6% in 2000.

3.8 Balance of Payments

In 2015, the IDB member countries as a whole had a current account deficit of US\$ 192 billion (or 3.2% of GDP). This was a full five percentage-point deterioration relative to 2014, and could be explained mostly by a 10% of GDP deterioration, among the fuel-exporting IDB member countries (**Figure 14**). In contrast, the average current account deficit

for the Asia region member countries remained steady at around 0.6% of GDP. The member countries with the largest current account deficits were Turkey (US\$ 32.7 billion, 4.5% of GDP), Algeria (US\$ 31.0 billion, 17.7% of GDP), Saudi Arabia (US\$ 22.4 billion, 3.5% of



GDP), Iraq (US\$ 20.9 billion, 12.7% of GDP), Indonesia (US\$ 19.6 billion, 2.2% of GDP), Libya (US\$ 18.5 billion, 62.2% of GDP), Lebanon (US\$ 11.4 billion or 21% of GDP), and Oman (US\$ 10.2 billion, 16.9% of GDP).

The member countries which continued to maintain large current account surpluses in 2015 were Kuwait (US\$ 11.4 billion, 9.3% of GDP), UAE (US\$ 9.8 billion, 2.9% of GDP), Qatar (US\$ 9.7 billion, 5% of GDP), and Malaysia (US\$ 6.9 billion, 2.2% of GDP).

The IDB member countries' total gross international reserves (including monetary gold held by the central banks) rose from US\$ 1.32 trillion in 2009 to US\$ 1.93 trillion in 2013, but declined to US\$ 1.90 trillion in 2015 — again reflecting the large fluctuations in oil prices experienced over the past six years. At the end of 2014, Saudi Arabia had the largest stock of gross international reserves (US\$ 744 billion), followed by Algeria (US\$ 186 billion), Turkey (US\$ 127 billion), Malaysia (US\$ 116 billion), and Indonesia (US\$ 112 billion).

3.9 External and Government Debt


The total external debt of the IDB member countries increased from US\$ 408 billion in 1990 to US\$ 1.52 trillion in 2014. Turkey had the highest stock of external debt (US\$ 408.2 billion, 51.6% of GDP), followed by Indonesia (US\$ 293.4 billion, 34.1% of GDP), Malaysia (US\$ 210.8 billion, 66.8% of GDP), and Kazakhstan (US\$ 157.6 billion, 83.3% of GDP). The average external debt-to-Gross National Income (GNI) ratio fell from 53.5% in 1990 to 30.5% in 2014 with an average debt service-to-GNI ratio falling from 6.4% to 3.6% over the same period.

Meanwhile, for the IDB member countries as a group, the average gross government debt to GDP ratio declined slightly to 32.2% in 2015 from 35.4% ten years earlier. The decline in the aggregate figure was mainly driven by the MENA region's oil exporters, whereas during the same period government indebtedness nearly doubled in Sub-Saharan Africa (rising from 11.9% of GDP to 20%) and in the CIT region (rising from 12.3% of GDP to 26.2%).

4 IDB GROUP OPERATIONS

The cumulative net financing approvals of the IDB Group totalled US\$ 113.6 billion at the end of 1436H. Of this figure, trade financing operations accounted for US\$ 60.7 billion

(53.4% of the total),followed by project operations and financing of US\$ 51.8 billion (45.5%), assistance special operations US\$ 743 million (0.7%),and technical assistance operations of US\$ 429.9 million (0.4%). Of the special assistance





operations US\$ 296 million was approved for Muslim communities in non-member countries.

The IDB member countries that received IDB Group financing in excess of US\$ 2 billion since the Bank's inception were Bangladesh (US\$ 18.1 billion), Egypt (US\$ 9.9 billion), Pakistan (US\$ 9.8 billion), Turkey (US\$ 8.8 billion), Morocco (US\$ 5.8 billion), Iran (US\$ 5.9 billion), Saudi Arabia (US\$ 4.7 billion), Indonesia (US\$ 3.7 billion), Tunisia (US\$ 3.2 billion), Algeria (US\$ 2.5 billion), Jordan (US\$ 2.4), Senegal (US\$ 2.0 billion), and Bahrain (US\$2.0 billion) (**Figure 15**).

Table 5 presents the list of top-5 beneficiaries of the IDB Group's project financing, trade financing, technical assistance and special assistance operations.
